One of the things we talked about was sharing the cost of speakers. I am pleased to advise that we are sharing costs with the Toronto Modern Quilt Guild for the July 26 meeting which will feature Chawne Kimber, an American speaker, whose topic is "When the Cotton is High: Social Justice and Textiles"; very topical for these troubled times.

After basic training from Becky, the Tech Team members attended a Royal City Quilters Guild online meeting, showing us what experienced tech people can bring to their members. It was very inspiring for us!

I also attended CQA's virtual Annual General Meeting, getting ideas for our own January AGM if we're not able to meet in person then.

All of this is in addition to our Tuesday CQ Zoom meeting, initiated by Wendy Dines, where I see what friends are up to, and talk about plans for CQ projects.

Some things are still a bit difficult, of course. Shopping for fabric online is a bit harder than doing it in person (colour matching, anyone?). Wearing masks in 30 degree plus weather is daunting. And not being to plan social events or travel adventures or go to a movie or play or concert is disappointing. These are, however, first world/entitled life problems. ZOOM

Learning About Zoom

For the past month, the YHQG Tech Team has been working on getting ready for the guild's first Zoom practice meetings.

This involved a lengthy training session, reviewing reams (megabytes?) of materials, attending a virtual guild meeting as



guests, figuring out what Zoom program to purchase for the guild, setting up a new email address for receipt of Show and Share (S&S) photos, putting together S&S slide shows and learning how to present them, preparing a Zoom teaching video, attending a Tech Team practice session, and organizing a Zoom practice guild executive meeting. As you can see, there's been a lot of work involved, and we didn't quite make our hoped-for June Guild meeting, but we're now ready to welcome you all to York Heritage Virtual!

You are invited to attend Zoom Guild Meetings which will be held on July 7 and 14 at 7:00 p.m. Zoom "doors" will open at 6:45. Zoom invitations for each meeting will be sent by email to members a day or two before each meeting.

We know that many of you may not be familiar with all the features of Zoom. We will include Zoom training sessions at our July 7 and 14 meetings, and will have a meeting solely dedicated to Zoom training on September 8 in case you can't make one of the July meetings, or in case you want to have a review before our regular September meeting, which will take place virtually.

If you don't have a computer/tablet/iPhone/etc., don't worry. You will be able to phone into the meeting and listen. You won't get to see the various presentations, but you will be able to hear the various participants in the meetings.

The July meetings will consist of an introduction to Zoom for users of all platforms, a few brief announcements, Show and Share, and an opportunity for attendees to ask questions and chat with one another.

I would like to point out that these are practice meetings for the Tech Team as well as for our members. We're still learning how to do this. *There will be glitches—please be patient!*

Participation in Show and Share

Please send photos of your Show and Share items to yhqg.zoom@gmail.com at least three days prior to the meeting at which you wish to show them. For Tuesday meetings, that means you should get them in by the preceding Saturday, at the very latest. Our Tech Team needs time to put together the presentation.

At the virtual meeting, you will have an opportunity to speak about your project. When taking photos, if there are areas of your project which you wish to highlight (e.g., sections with embellishment), include a close-up photo as well. Make sure that you include your name in the email which you send in to us.

Keep in mind that, if you plan to display your quilt in a quilt show, you should probably not submit it to Show and Share depending upon the rules of the show you intend to exhibit.

All photos submitted to Show and Share will be added to the guild's Instagram and Facebook accounts (anonymously, so the name of the quilter is not indicated) unless the person submitting the photos clearly indicates in their email that they do not wish to have their project shown on Instagram/Facebook.

We plan to include the summer Show and Share photos at the September Zoom meeting as well. If you don't want this to be done, please indicate this in your email to yhqg.zoom@gmail.com.



Alleviating Your Zoom Concerns About Security

Over the course of a few months, Zoom's number of daily users rocketed from 10 million to 300 million. With this huge increase, people have started asking questions about the product's security and privacy. In response, Zoom has been making regular updates to maintain security.

Some of Zoom's features were developed to make the product easy to use. Unfortunately, those same features have been abused by mischief makers. Most of the complaints about Zoom have to do with new users doing things they didn't realize are unsafe. These kinds of mistakes are easy to avoid with a little knowledge.

You may have heard of Zoombombing, which is to have one's meeting interrupted by unwanted guests doing truly inappropriate things. It's unlikely anyone will be able to zoombomb one of our guild meetings. York Heritage Quilters Guild does not post our meeting invitations online so zoom bombers won't find our meetings. In addition, everyone attending our meetings is automatically put in an online waiting room and must be admitted by a meeting host. It's a lot like the way you live in your home. When someone knocks at your door, you look out the peephole to decide, on a case-by-case basis, who you will invite inside. The Zoom waiting room performs the same function. If the meeting host doesn't recognize a person in the waiting room, they don't get to come in to the meeting. And, if we accidentally admit someone who doesn't know how to act, the meeting host can remove them from the meeting with a few clicks of the mouse.

Another feature of Zoom lets you give control of your computer to another person. If someone you trust is trying to help you solve a problem, that's a nice feature to have. However, naive Zoom users have handed over control to someone they didn't know and been shocked when the stranger caused trouble! York Heritage Zoom hosts will NOT be handing control of their computers to strangers and neither should you!!

If you are using Zoom to meet with friends and family, be sure to keep up with the latest updates just as you do with your computer. Updating your Zoom software ensures your device has the latest security improvements as soon as they are ready for the general public.

No product is perfect but for now we think Zoom is the best available option. If we find something better or safer, we will make a switch. No matter the product, we will use it in responsible ways to keep our members (and ourselves) safe online.

Other Comments

Special Presentation July 2020

We do not normally hold a meeting in July, but as in so many other ways, this year is different. On July 26, we will hold a joint virtual meeting with the Toronto Modern Quilt Guild (TMQG) at 3:30 pm featuring a presentation by Dr. Chawne Kimber titled *When Cotton is High: Textiles and Social Justice*.

A native of Florida, Dr. Chawne Kimber is a Professor of Mathematics at Lafayette College in Pennsylvania. She's also a quilt maker with a message.

From womenarts.org, "Chawne Kimber is making some of the most powerful artworks today about race, language, women's rights, and police brutality—all with a needle and thread. Kimber tackles these issues with provocative art quilts and colorful embroideries, all hand-pieced and stitched in painstaking detail.



Kimber has become a celebrity in the quilting world because of her political themes and her incredible technical skill. For instance, her piece based on the last words of Eric Garner, The One for Eric (2015), won first place in Improvisational Piecing at QuiltCon West, one of the largest modern quilt shows in the world, and was featured on the front page of the L.A. Times.

In that quilt Kimber sewed the phrase "I can't breathe," over and over in white text that slowly fades to blue against a textured black and red background."

Andrea strives to push the limits of the quilting medium by exploring scale and dimension and moving traditionally domestic objects into the public realm.

Having enjoyed incredible success in design, publication, and teaching, Karen finds no greater satisfaction than in hand stitching binding onto a newly quilted piece, with the possible exception of students returning to report they're having a lot more fun quilting since taking her color class.

Please call/email the person at your preferred drop-off location first, to arrange a convenient drop off time.


Here's what we've received recently.

inclusion in a new YHQG banner to be displayed at our



The challenge is a simple one. Make a ten and a half inch (10½") square block, using one of the challenge fabrics. Please do not quilt the block. We want flimsies only!

TIP: The fabric is red and red runs—wash it until the water runs clear before creating with it!

The style of the block is up to you! However, the challenge fabric must be included in the block. The block can be a traditional one. It can be a modern one. It can be pictorial. It can be a landscape. It can be an improv block. You can add embellishments. You can add fabrics, as long as one of the designated fabrics is included.

LIBRARY BOOK REVIEW



Jelly Roll Quilts

At the beginning of our social distancing period I decided to have a good look at my personal library because I thought I would have oodles of time for quilting. I found Jelly Roll Quilts by Pam and Nicky Lintott. It was first published by David & Charles Book in 2008 and is also in our YHQG library.

I have multiple jelly rolls and I can never quite decide what I want to do with them. In the first line of the book they ask, "which looks so beautiful you don't like to unroll it?". That spoke to me. But this book is going to entice me to unroll them and give one or two of their projects a try.

The book provides information on getting started, various relevant information, and has 17 projects all starting with the jelly roll (they do explain that you can make your own jelly roll, it does not need to be a purchased one). The two projects I have my eye on only require the jelly roll and a bit of other fabric for border and binding. There are also a couple of projects that use the jelly roll for colour and add background fabric of varying amounts to make a larger quilt.

The book also includes a section for "General Techniques" that I found interesting. While most of it is basic information, I liked that it is explained in a concise but thorough manner. I particularly like the section on seams, such as why a scant ¼ inch seam is important, and how to check your accuracy.

All in all, a good book that I would highly recommend.

Now, If I can just finish the quilt that I am working on, this will be my next project.
