Innovation and tradition motivate Karen K. Stone, a quilter since 1986. Her quilts have won numerous awards, including first prizes in international competitions, and her designs appear frequently in exhibitions and on magazine covers. Her "Clam Session" quilt was awarded Master of Innovative Artistry at the 2009 International Quilt Festival, and her "Indian Orange Peel" quilt was the People's Choice at Quilt National 1995.

Having enjoyed incredible success in design, publication, and teaching, Karen finds no greater satisfaction than in hand stitching binding onto a newly quilted piece, with the possible exception of students returning to report they're having a lot more fun quilting since taking her color class.

# **Saturday, November 21 English Paper Piecing by Machine**

Do you love but avoid the traditional one-patch? Handwork is wonderful, but let's explore an

innovative machine technique, useful for any pattern that would be English paper pieced, without compromising the integrity of the original. We begin with hexagons, then move quickly to a Sunburst star, like in the pictured quilt, simplified for class. You'll enjoy having this in your bag of tricks!

Supply list: 10-15 fat quarters (or equivalent) from stash, some of which should read solid.

#### **Cityscape Improv Workshop**

In this class students will learn a new approach to deconstructing/improv strip piecing and create a late summer's eve cityscape, including bright lights, dark skies, and modern tower blocks, filling this quilt in a modern way with a new approach to quilting I call Overlay Quilting.

Students will explore value, learn how to Improv strip-piece, and build dark skies and modern tower blocks and will complete making their quilt top. In the afternoon students will learn several modern quilting motifs including grid work, matchstick and overlay quilting. This workshop provides a great space for exploring freedom of choice. All students are encouraged to work beyond the guidelines and create a one of a kind 18-inch square modern quilt.

Volunteers keep our Guild running! We urgently need volunteers for the following positions.

# **CQA/ACC** Diversity Award of Excellence

In July, after Dr. Chawne Kimber spoke to us, one of our members asked how we could increase diversity in our quilting guilds. The response she made that I recall was to encourage young people of colour to learn how to quilt. While this is something which we might tackle after Covid, it clearly isn't something that we can do during the pandemic, so I started to try to think about other ways that we could show our support for the BIPOC community in Canada. This is what I came up with: create a national award specifically for quilts made by people self-identifying as BIPOC—Black, Indigenous, People of Colour<sup>1</sup>.

I propose that the guild and its members sponsor a \$1,000 prize to be awarded to an entrant who self-identifies as BIPOC in the CQA/ACC annual *Quilt Canada* show. The goal is to present the award at the 2021 CQA/ACC quilt show next June.

I've spoken to Jane Cramer, the president of CQA/ACC, about this concept. She indicated that she thought the CQA/ACC board would be interested in it. But, to guarantee that the prize could be awarded for at least two years, we would need to raise a minimum of \$2,000 before CQA/ACC would agree to create the award. And three years and \$3,000 is preferable. One of our members has pledged \$1,250.00 to start the fund.

At our November meeting, we will be polling our members to find out if they would like the guild to take this concept on, and, if so, what amount they would like the guild to donate to the fund. My hope is that the guild would be authorized to provide the sum of \$500 this year, and to consider making a similar contribution next year and in future years. This would be in addition to our usual annual sponsorship of \$1,000 to CQA/ACC. We would ask the members of our guild to individually donate the rest of the required funds, so that it is clear that this is a communal effort, supported not only by the guild as a whole, but by the individual members. We can use the donation button on the guild's website for our members to contribute individual amounts to the fund.

In future years when we can get together physically, we can do some fundraising (mini silent auctions, 50/50 draws, etc.) to help build up the trust fund for the award. If we find that it's difficult for our guild to raise the funds on our own, we could certainly ask other guilds to support the award. By calling this the CQA/ACC Diversity Award, we would not be committing the guild and its members to always fund the award.

Until our November meeting, please give some thought to this suggestion, so that you'll be ready to ask any questions that you might have and you'll be ready to vote on this proposal. Keep in mind if you will, that 2021 is the 40th anniversary of the creation of the Canadian Quilters Association, the brainchild of York Heritage Quilters Guild and the Etobicoke Quilters' Guild back in 1981. Wouldn't the creation of a new award which celebrates the diversity of our community be a fitting way to celebrate!

<sup>1</sup>BIPOC stands for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color. Black can refer to dark-skinned peoples of Africa, Oceania, and Australia or their descendants without regard for the lightness or darkness of skin tone, and who were enslaved by white people. Indigenous, here, refers to ethnic groups native to the Americas, and who were killed en masse by white people. People of color is an umbrella term for non-white people, especially as they face racism and discrimination in a white dominant culture.

Growing in use and awareness during the 2020 George Floyd protests against racism and police brutality, *BIPOC* is meant to emphasize the particular hardships faced by Black and Indigenous people in the US and Canada—especially because Indigenous people often get forgotten in social justice causes and that anti-Black racism is particularly virulent.

The committee for the Grand National challenges you to create a work of fibre art using the theme *Crossroads*. As time goes on, one encounters a point at which the normal path through life is divided. A decision



must be made. Which way does one go? For better or worse, the future will take a new path. Create a fibre art piece that represents a crossroad past, present or future that has a profound meaning to you and accompany it with your story.


# Covid-19 Log **CABIN FEVER** Challenge

Since the onset of the Covid-19 global pandemic, we've all been asked to stay in our homes and minimize social interactions. Our world seems to have been put on pause while we all practice good hand hygiene and safe social distancing. Some say that quilters have been preparing for an experience like this since the first needle was threaded. But seeing the same four walls, day in and day out, hasn't been easy. To help break this cabin fever and celebrate our contributions to keeping each other safe, let's design our own version of a log cabin block. *BEAT THAT CABIN FEVER!* 

### What is a log cabin pattern?

Traditionally, a log cabin begins with a centre square and sewing strips in sequence around the sides of the square. It is arranged in a repeated single block pattern that can be made of light and dark fabrics which represent the walls of a log cabin and the centre square represents the hearth or heart of the home.

The blocks to be arranged in multiple ways and create different repeats or designs. The possibilities are endless!



Be as creative as you want and show us your own version of a log cabin. We want your creation to tell us a story: what has 2020 been like for you. The only stipulation is that that it is a finished product. Quilted, framed, sewn, appliquéd – whichever makes your vision complete.

#### **Size**

As small as a 2"x 2" block or as big as a king size bed – the size is up to you!

#### **Material**

Go stash diving. Use that piece of fabric that's been sitting in your stash from your first visit to a fabric store. Use anything that fits your vision!

#### 2021 TrendTex Challenge: Friendship



TrendTex Fabrics is once again generously donating beautiful fabrics for CQA/ACC's 33rd annual wall quilt challenge with the theme Friendship. Get in on the fun of this long-lasting tradition. What will your quilt look like?

Your design may be modern or traditional and any combination of machine and/or hand piecing, appliqué or quilting is acceptable. Embellishments are at the quilter's discretion. All five of the fabrics in the kit shown above must be clearly visible on the front of your

wall quilt and you may add three additional fabrics of your own choosing. Quilts will be judged on general appearance, design, workmanship, and the use of the challenge fabric.

To join the challenge, request the kit (five TrendTex fabrics cut into fat quarters) using the <u>online order form</u> and paying for it using the shopping cart. If you prefer to mail in your form with payment, <u>check the CQA/ACC website</u> for details.

Until January 1, 2021, there is a limit of one kit per person; additional kits may be purchased after that date, if available.

All wall quilts will become the property of CQA/ACC and be displayed at Quilt Canada 2021 in June. As a gesture of thanks, the TrendTex award-winning wall quilt will be given to TrendTex Fabrics, Inc. and all others will be sold at our popular silent auction.

The TrendTex Challenge Entry Form will be available online December 1, 2020. Get your entry in by April 5, 2021 in order to be eligible for judging. If you wish to donate a quilt for the silent auction fundraiser without having it judged it must be received by May 27, 2021. ### Louise Patterson 1919 - 2020

It is with great sadness, tinged with relief, that I share the news of my mother's death on October 22 at the age of 101. She was a member of YHQG for 31 years. Over the last 13 years mum struggled with dementia, which gradually robbed her of the capacity to do many of the things she loved – including her passion for quilting.

Mum was a charter member of the guild, taught several classes, and served on the executive as newsletter editor in the 1980s. She fully embraced the community of quilters that is our guild, and found much pleasure in the friendship of a small group that quilted together, the Suttle Seamers.

She had an enviable sense of colour and her artistry was evident in everything she produced. She certainly provided the impetus for me to begin quilting. A few years ago, when she moved with my dad to a retirement residence, we were able to brighten the lives of our extended family with close to 50 of her quilts and wall hangings.
