Welcome back everyone!

Even in Covid times, summer flies away quickly. I feel like it was June just last week! Typically, during the summer, guild work lightens up but this summer had a number of initiatives which kept us busy.

First of all, there were (and are) horrific fires in the west, and in northern Ontario. In July, Community Quilting pulled out twenty quilts from its stash, and sent them off to BC for distribution to people impacted by the fires. You can see a heartfelt video from the recipient organizers.

The heartbreaking announcement of the discovery of the graves of hundreds of Indigenous children at former residential school sites led to a drive to create Quilts for Survivors to comfort those whose memories of traumatic experiences were triggered by the discoveries. Three boxes full of blocks and donations have already been collected from our guild members and sent off to Vanessa Génier, the organizer of this project. More donations of blocks, batting, tops or completed quilts (blocks must include the colour orange) can still be made. You can drop your donations off at any of the CQ donation locations listed in this newsletter and we'll make sure they'll go out. So far, the cut off date for donations of blocks is October 11, 2021. After that, only donations of full tops or quilts will be accepted. If you want to donate on your own, more information is included later in this newsletter.

Members of Community Quilting have been beavering away, completing memorial quilts for Flags of Hope, which were displayed at Overdose Awareness Day on August 31st at Toronto City Hall. Thanks to all of the members who made this happen, Mical P., Bev S., Jacintha B., Wendy D., Irena H. and Ann S.

It sounds like it was only sad news this summer, but good things have been happening too!

Another Sampler weekend has been organized by Global Quilt Connections, like the one which many of you attended in May. The guild has signed up, so all our members can attend this event on October 2 and 3. You'll see several different quilt teachers for about fifteen minutes each. You will likely not make any projects, but this event will hopefully introduce you to some teachers you'd like to learn from at future workshops or introduce you to a new skill you'd like to learn. More information is included later in this newsletter.

We're in the process of organizing our second International Quilting Day event with co-host Royal City Quilters Guild. We will be joined in 2022 by Waterloo County Quilters Guild. I'm excited by the topics which speakers from York Heritage will be talking about and can't wait to see the rest of the program! The event will take place on Saturday, March 19, 2022, so mark your calendars!



Meetings will be held virtually through the Zoom platform on the third Tuesday of the month.

"Doors" will open at 6:45 pm. the meeting will begin at 7:00 pm, and run until 9:00 pm.

Invitations to each month's meeting, which includes the link to the meeting, will be sent out a few days prior to each meeting.






the course of the pandemic allowed us to respond quickly.

Let's get together To create quilts for our Survivors







In memory of all the small voices that we lost

Started by quilting powerhouse Vanessa Génier, quilts are being made to be gifted to survivors of the Residential Schools. Vanessa is looking for donations of the following items:

16.5 inch square unfinished blocks, each containing the colour orange;

Finished quilts or quilt tops again, each containing the colour orange;

Backing fabrics and batting for completion of quilts.

Blocks can be forwarded to her, to be received no later than October 11, 2021.

Finished quilts or quilt tops, backing fabrics and batting can be forwarded after that date.

Donations can be dropped of at any of the CQ drop-off locations listed in the CQ section of this newsletter. Individual donations can be sent directly to Vanessa Génier at 130 Tamarack Street, Timmins, Ontario, P4N 6P8. If you have a completed quilt to donate, consider contacting Vanessa directly and she can arrange for you to forward it directly to the recipient.



1200 Update to the Latest Version of Zoom

It's important to always keep your Zoom account updated for the best user experience. Zoom <u>regularly provides new versions</u> of the Zoom desktop client and mobile app to release new features and fix bugs. We recommend upgrading to the latest version once it is available. You can also <u>check which version you're currently running</u>.

Follow Zoom's release notes to stay updated on the latest Zoom releases.

For the best experience during our guild meetings, particularly when using breakout rooms, please ensure that you update your Zoom account before each of the monthly guild meetings.

In 2017, Irene Paterson lost her only son, Roger Wong, to fentanyl poisoning. Roger had been in recovery for six months and then a very close friend of his died. Roger couldn't get over it, and relapsed one time. It killed him.

In 2020, Ontario recorded 2,426 opioid-related deaths. As the Toronto Star says, this is Canada's other epidemic.

After Roger's death, Irene was traumatised. She joined online group Moms Stop the Harm and learned about a Western Canada initiative called Flags of Hope. In 2018, she held a workshop at Toronto's Trinity Church in which participants wrote and coloured on white cloth flags in memory of friends and loved ones who had died of opioid overdoses. The flags were displayed in Nathan Phillips Square at Toronto City Hall on Opioid Awareness Day in August, 2018.

Late last year, Irene, working with the charity Sistering, thought about the AIDS quilts of the late 1900s and decided to try to have the original flags turned into quilts. YHQG member Mical Pearlman suggested approaching YHQG for help.

Bev S., Jacintha B., and Wendy D. worked with representatives from Sistering to develop a prototype quilt to display the original flags, bordering all quilts in a consistent purple fabric to reflect the Flags of Hope signature colour. The original flags-intended to be hung on a line, not included in quilts—had to be carefully trimmed and stabilized in order to produce neat blocks for quilting purposes. Ornamental items, such as feathers and other ornaments, had to be carefully removed before the quilting process and then, just as carefully, reattached to their original blocks. Irene Paterson produced a central "Flags of Hope" block for insertion in the centre of each quilt top. Talented quilter/designer Bev Stevens prepared every quilt top for quilting using different colours for the interior sashing of each quilt all edged by purple borders. Several very experienced, talented quilters, Jacintha B., Wendy D., Irena H., and Ann S., completed the sandwiching, quilting, and binding of each quilt and added sleeves to the top and bottom of each quilt so they could hang properly. It was a labour of love, especially for Bev S., who lost her beloved nephew to an opioid overdose shortly after this quilting project began.

The YHQG quilts, together with a beautiful quilt prepared by Sistering clients with individual embroidered squares, was displayed on August 31, 2021 at Nathan Phillips Square, City Hall, Toronto, as the Opioid Awareness Flag was raised at 11:00. At 8:00, in Roundhouse Park, 255 Bremner Boulevard, the CN Tower was illuminated purple in recognition of International Overdose Awareness Day.

York Heritage members are proud to have been a part of this project.





Heather B.

In January 2022, current vice president Heather B. will stand for election to be the next president of our guild, replacing Anne McLauchlan at the end of her two-year term, and Anne will move into the past president role for the next year. We asked Heather to introduce herself to the guild in the following member profile.

Hello everyone,

Many years ago, when I was busy working full-time, I bought a pretty quilt pattern and fabric kit in a gift shop and thought to myself "When I retire, I'll make this." It went into the closet and that was that.

After leaving the full-time work world for a much lighter schedule a few years ago, I started cleaning out the cupboards and saw the kit. I inherited my mother's wonderful Singer sewing machine. But it must have been made from cast iron because it was really heavy to move around in our small house where there's no separate area for it to stay set up.

The sewing machine was traded in for a lighter model that came with quilting attachments which were quite mysterious, given my basic sewing background. Luckily, the kit pattern was quite straightforward in simple blocks and strips and I was able to assemble the guilt top without too much trouble. Thank you YouTube!

Around that time, I met Arlette Adam on a hiking group outing. She told me all about the York Heritage Quilters Guild and kindly invited me to join her at a guild meeting. It was such a large group and the Show and Share was a revelation of talent and artistry. I proudly showed my first quilt top at that meeting with a lot more enthusiasm than expertise on display! I donated that first quilt through Community Quilting and hope the recipient is enjoying it and not looking too closely at the details.

After that I was hooked on all the beautiful patterns and gorgeous fabrics that people used in quiltmaking. I joined the guild before the next meeting and started to drink in lots of great information and expertise. One of the YHQG guest speakers, Cindy Griselda, ran a terrific free motion workshop and I started to learn more about machine quilting online and through further guild workshops.

Around that time the guild executive was searching for people who could volunteer their time in specific roles. I didn't feel qualified to lead any initiatives that required deep quilting experience, but with my business management background I was comfortable in saying yes to the vice president role which is a one-year learning role leading to the

president position. Anne has been a wonderful teacher and mentor and shows how the many facets of the president role keeps us all on track hers will be very big shoes to fill!

I wanted to make something for my sister Janice who loves sunflowers, so we found a beautiful pattern by Jennifer Houlden. This project turned out to be really painstaking and challenging, with dozens of bargello strips to make the sunflower pod and petals and other new techniques like applique and checkerboard borders. I had to jump right into the deep end not knowing what I didn't know! Luckily Jennifer agreed to give me an inperson tutorial at her beautiful water-access-only home on a lake island close to Gravenhurst. She was very gracious with her time and my sister loves the resulting wall hanging.

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Since then I've made some smaller quilts as gifts and am currently completing a bed quilt for our cottage. My inventory has been growing and there are so many fantastic fabric and pattern designers out there. It's getting dangerous! This summer I read the autobiography of Kaffe Fassett "Dreaming in Color" and am inspired by his passion for and application of bold colours in quilting and other crafts. My next ambitious project will be a combination of his "Losing My Marbles" pattern and Timna Tarr's "O Happy Day." Both patterns appliqué dots onto contrasting small squares—lots of circles in my future!

At a recent CQ sew-along, someone said they realized they were primarily an art quilter, meaning someone who uses both modern and traditional quilting techniques to create art objects. My pleasure comes from finding beautiful patterns of any kind and then finding fabric that will be a great match to bring the quilt alive. Knowing where the quilt will be used or who the quilt is for has turned out to be an important element that helps to bring the final design together. I love making quilt tops, while quilting and finishing on my home machine are trickier because space is tight. Like many quilters, I've been busy gathering all the tools of the trade, but I must confess my favourite one so far is a magnetized pin holder—what a timesaver! My dreams include a future design wall and new machine with a stich regulator and larger throat. Here's hoping.

The guild has been very welcoming and people share so much quilting knowledge that it all seems possible! The Community Quilting initiatives are heartwarming and such a great way to give back. I'm really looking forward to meeting more members in person and contributing to the guild as it comes out of the pandemic and looks forward to more good times together.



For my 2-year-old great niece Bea, using Monkey Wrench by Tula Pink, pattern by Denyse Schmidt. This was a great opportunity to learn about sewing curves and measuring one 10" layer cake of 42 pieces to the last scrap! I love how designers put fabrics together in such interesting ways—it stretches my "matchy-matchy" instincts way beyond my comfort zone with better results. Can you see the monkey in the middle?



I just gave this lap quilt to my good friend Bev on a visit to Nova Scotia this summer. We both love toile! The pattern is called Winter Solstice by McCall and I ordered the toile and houndstooth fabric from a company that imprints onto quilting cotton if you can't find the fabric elsewhere.
