Thanksgiving is one of the most colourful times of our calendar, which should make all of us colour-loving quilters happy!



Saturday, March 26, 2022 Organic Shapes





What got you started in quilting?

I've been sewing all my life. In 1990, I had my own small business designing, sewing, and creating custom specialty clothes for children. I separated from my husband that year and closed my business. I needed a distraction to keep me busy, so I asked a friend, Thelma Wilson who was a member of York Heritage Quilters Guild (YHQG), to teach me how to make a quilt. I had made a quilt many years before for a friend, but it was made with polyester batting and so I felt that it didn't really count. I decided I wanted to make an Amish quilt because black was used in the background and that was where I was emotionally. Thelma coached me through the process. I did a typical Amish basket quilt, which I machine pieced. I hand cut all the pieces with scissors and used cardboard templates, as I had none of the tools that we have now. Quilting kept my mind busy and it gave me a challenge.

How long have you been in York Heritage, as a member?

I'm not really sure. In 1990, when I started quilting, YHQG has a long wait list. Also, a consideration for me was the cost of babysitting to go to a meeting, but I put my name down and waited. Eventually my name came up and when I could leave my children at home alone, I started. I'm not sure when that was but I'm guessing somewhere around 2000.

Why did you join the guild?

Originally, to learn because I didn't know a lot about quilting. I didn't know anything about the different types or techniques such as foundation paper piecing, chain piecing or English paper piecing. They were a foreign language to me. I also joined for the community. I enjoyed being with a group of like-minded people who talked the same language.

What do you like best about being a York Heritage member?

I'd have to put it down to community of like-minded people.

What's a favourite quilt you've made?

Every quilt is my favourite quilt when I'm working on it. Usually when I start working on a quilt, it's a new idea, new technique, and a new challenge. For me it's about the challenge. I ask myself, "how do they do that?" and then I figure it out. Sometimes, about two thirds of the way through the project, I'm done with it and I'll put it away. Eventually, it will come out and get finished. For me, it's all about trying this new thing or a different colour combination. Recently I put away a traditional nine-patch, but it's in pastel colours and, as I don't usually work in soft colours, I've grown tired of it. I've put it away twice now. I think I'm at 300 of 400 blocks and I know that eventually I'll get there. For me, it's usually about doing something different. I fall in love with an idea or fabric but then I might fall out of love with it. I'm still in like, but I'll finish it later after a rest from it. I do love log cabin quilts. I've done several of them in different variations and I fall back on a derivative of a log cabin quite often. I also love wool appliqué. When I first started doing wool appliqué I used prepared kits. Now I dye my own fabric and create my own designs.

Do you have a favourite quilt that you have never made; one that you saw or made by somebody else?

The quilt I always wanted to make is a micro log cabin. The little, tiny 1/8" or 1/4" strips. I've never done it because

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of the precision needed. Also, I know how heavy these quilts are when they are finished and I think, "what would I do with this thing after it's done?" There were a number of these quilts on display when I went to the quilt show in Nantes, France. They were created by Japanese quilters and their strips were 3 threads wide. Yikes, 3 threads! I

have close-up pictures of it and wonder how the heck did they do that without it fraying, because you would need to trim the seam allowance down quite small. When you know the mechanics of how it had to be created, it's just mystifying. For me, that's the challenge. That is what I would love to figure out some day.

Do you have a quilt currently on your bed?

Yes. The quilt I have on my bed right now is called *One Thousand Three Hundred and Sixty Pieces of my Mind*. The title I wanted to give it is *Circles from Hell* but I was vetoed on that one. Nancy McCracken showed her quilt designed by Becky Goldsmith one year at the Quilts at the Creek show. It was foundation paper pieced, which I had never done. A bunch of us fell in love with it so we all challenged each other to make one for the next year's show. I got these large, photocopied papers delivered to me of half circles and I basically said, "what have I gotten myself into?" I had to teach myself how to paper piece. I know, I could have reversed that, but that's not how I usually operate.



Do you have a "WHAT WAS I THINKING?" quilt?

That would be *Circles from Hell*. But that also happens to me quite often as I get caught up with a new idea and have no idea how to bring it to fruition. I'll say, "hey, I'm going to do that" and then I get home and think, "why did I do that? I don't know what I'm doing." So, it requires some research or questions, but that's exactly how I got into quilting in the first place. That's my modus operandi.

What are you working on right now and what's in the future?

I've been doing a lot of baby quilts because my kids' friends are all having babies. Quilts are such a large part of my kids' lives and they now want to give quilts to their friends. We have a deal: they pay the cost and I do the labour.



Usually I know one of the new parents as they've been in and out of my house all their lives. We had an open-door policy when my kids were younger and, really, we still do. Recently, I finished a 100-day hand sewing challenge from Instagram. I started out making a 6" appliquéd block every day but soon realized that I wouldn't be able to keep up so I appliquéd one day and then embellished it the next. I was a little bit lost for a couple of days after I finished it. Not that I didn't have a ton of UFO's that I could have picked up and started. I've also been dyeing my own wool fabric. I've purchased a few new dye colours so now I'm hoping for a nice clear sunny day this week to dye more fabric before it gets too cold.

How many sewing machines do you have and are you loyal to a brand?



I have 5 that I use regularly. When I had my sewing business, I had a Bernina industrial machine, which I've made thousands of garments on. I've put that in the basement now because it has a built-in table and takes up a lot of space. I currently use a Bernina 770 which was my gift to myself when I retired. I also have a Bernina serger, which I used for my business and continue to use sometimes. I also have an older basic Bernina which I use when I teach. I guess that makes me a Bernina girl. I also have a Singer Featherweight that I use when I take a workshop. People have donated machines to me and, because of the pandemic, I haven't done anything with them as they need to be serviced. They are in transition; waiting to go to a group, perhaps refugees, who want to sew and weren't able to bring their machines from home. I also still have my old turquoise blue Singer sewing machine that I learned to sew on many garments ago.

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What about thread and tools?

I use Aurifil thread for my piecing. I also use deco-bob, which is an 80-weight man-made or synthetic thread from Wonderfil, for some piecing especially when I'm doing wool appliqué because it buries itself inside the wool.

Fabric-wise, I love big prints: Anna Maria Horner, Ruby Star Society. I buy them because I fall in love with the colours and the prints, not necessarily because I have a pattern or design in mind. One of the big print quilts I've made is hanging at Fabric Spark quilt store and I love it. It's called the Free Wheeling Single Girl and I have another all ready to go.

Other tools? Glue sticks. I use these quite regularly, particularly for appliqué and also paper piecing. If you're trying to match points or intersections, you can glue the seam together before you stitch. I use glue on my wool appliqué to tack pieces down before I stitch. I also go through erasable, washable pen markers quite a bit because if I'm not sure about a quilt design, I might draw it on the fabric first.

How do you organize your quilt-related items?

Basically, the Dollar Store loves me for all the bins I've bought. I sort my fabric by colour and then by type, for example linen. I do keep some of my specialty fabric separate such as my Anna Marie Horne prints. I also have a couple of mobile carts to store all my tools. My thread is organized by colour in bins with drawers.

What's the best thing about your sewing room?

It's everywhere in my house (LOL). I'm very lucky that I have a 3-bedroom house and my kids have moved out. In reality, I have a one-bedroom house with two sewing rooms. When I retired, I set it up this way because that's where I spend most of my time. I have a large cutting table and I made an 8' X 8' design wall so I can have two or three projects up on it at once. One of the things I do for my clothing patterns is put them all in ziploc bags and hang them with "S" hooks on my drapery rods. I've organized it so that it works for me. I have my fabrics mostly in one room and my sewing machines in the other room and I migrate between the rooms.

Who do you admire or follow on social media?

A. I follow a lot of different people; some are quilters, some are artists. I get inspiration from all over the place. Sometimes I look at an ad in a magazine and that will give me an idea for a wool appliqué block. Instagram (IG) has been great for me to use as I see what other people are doing and it makes me stop and think about their colour usage or adaptation. I use IG for inspiration all the time. The people I follow are Jacquie Gering, Quilted Portrait, Sue Spargo, Sarah Hibbert, Quilts Cornerstone, Laura Petrovicheney, and Saija Elina, just to name a few. (see links below)

What kind of interview would you like to see in future newsletters? Who in the guild would you like to read about?

I really like the idea of talking to new people and seeing where and what they are doing. It's great to have all the resources from people who have been creating quilts for so long, but I like to listen to new people as well because they
