Quilting with Rulers on Domestic Machines

Thursday, May 19 10:00 am to 3:30 pm Location Toronto Botanical Garden

This workshop is designed to teach you to understand how to work with rulers for domestic sewing machines. You will be shown how to master setting up your sewing machine and ruler foot. Handouts and tips for success will be shared along with step by step instructions for each style of ruler. Demonstrations and practise time will be allowed for students to create additional patterns to make the most of using their rulers.

Robin will demonstrate multiple brands and can instruct regardless of which brand you bring. Please bring two different rulers





Participants must have a ruler foot, a sewing machine with the ability to lower feed dogs, and an extension table (preferred)

The workshop will be held in-person at the Toronto Botanical Garden. There is a limit of 20 participants. The double classroom is located on the second floor and there is an elevator. There will be plenty space with a full 6' table and comfortable distancing for each participant.





Members' Boutique at Celebration of Quilts XIV - Fri Nov 11 & Sat Nov 12, 2022

The Members' Boutique provides a great opportunity for YHQG members to show and sell their "one of a kind" creations to show attendees. In the past, the boutique has been one of the highlights of our show! Any member who has a quilt hanging in the show is eligible to submit items for sale in the shop. You set the price and the guild retains 15%, so there's a nice fundraising element as well! New for this year, CQ is looking for donated items to sell in the shop.

The boutique is organized in categories: baby, kitchen, holiday, misc. Items should fit into one of these groups and must be quilted or quilt related. Quilted items include small baby quilts, wall hangings (less than 30"x40"), table runners, placemats, postcards etc. Non-quilted items might be things like bags, oven mitts, pin cushions, needle cases, aprons, fabric toys, holiday ornaments, etc. Quilting supplies such as notions (rulers, sewing machine accessories, trim, decorative thread, embellishments, etc.), books related to quilting/stitchery, FQ bundles etc. would fit into the "misc." category. If you have a quilt 30"x40" or larger, you can choose to price it and hang it in the show area. If it sells, the transaction will be processed in the shop, with 15% going to the guild.

In the fall, more information will be provided on how to tag and submit items. In the meanwhile, we hope you'll think about selling some of your wonderful creations in the boutique and perhaps work on small items or sort through your supply stash over the summer!

What got your started in quilting?

When my youngest was 7 or 8, about 12 years ago, I had the itch to start crafting again. I used to sew when I was younger. I made clothes. Then I had kids and all that went out the window. I was looking for something to do. I started making aprons, which I know may seem odd, but I just made apron after apron after apron. I must have made 40 of them. And then, I started wandering around on the internet and I found quilts. I never really grew up with quilts, but they caught my eye, so I jumped in with both feet and bought some supplies and started sewing!

What is your favourite quilt that you have made?

I really like all of the quilts that I've made. One of my favourites is my Edgar quilt as I call it. It is themed around Edgar Allan Poe. The fabric line was called "Nevermore", which was based on his works. I quilted some lines from his poems around the borders of the quilt. That's one of my favourites. Technicolour Galaxy is right up there as well.







How long have you been a YHQG member?

This is my first year. I joined in September 2021. During the pandemic I was looking for virtual guilds that were doing Zoom. I had a look at the programs and schedule that was coming up for the year and it looked very exciting. I wanted to be part of it. I know a few other members, so that is how I found out about this guild.

What do you like best about being a YHQG member?

The speakers, the workshops. The Scrappy Scrap Group has been interesting as well. Lots of things going on here. It's been a lot of fun. I love it all.

Do you have a quilt currently on your bed?

Yes I do. It is the Tula Pink City Sampler. It was run as 100 days, 100 blocks quilt-along a few years ago by Gnome Angel. I upsized it to a king and that's the one that's on our bed.

Favourite fabric, thread, tool, etc.?

I'm a big fan of Alison Glass and Libs Elliott fabrics. I love my Elna sewing machine and my light box (that I just got last year) for tracing appliqué shapes and embroidery patterns and that sort of thing. It makes the task of tracing easier than trying to hold it up to the window.

What is your quilting happy place? (piecing, appliqué, free motion quilting, etc.)

I love foundation paper piecing and free motion quilting. English Paper Piecing not so much. I like appliqué as well, mostly raw edge, but I am starting to do a little needle turn applique. I like it all, except for English Paper Piecing but I'll keep trying it from time to time.



How many sewing-related machines do you have?

Technically, I have three. I have two that I actually use. The other one is an old Singer treadle machine. It was my grandmothers so I have it stowed away right now. I don't use it at the moment. I don't remember her using it at all. I didn't even know she quilted until a couple of years ago. I was visiting a cousin and she pulled out a quilt that was in pretty rough shape. That was the first time I found out my grandmother even quilted. Unfortunately she's not with us anymore. It would be nice to hear about some of her history with quilting.

Do you have a sewing room or dedicated space? What's the best thing about it?

I have a dedicated sewing space in our walk-out basement. The best thing about it is the view of the lake.

How do you organize all of your quilting-related stuff?

I have bins for different colours and for different sizes (FQ bins and others for larger cuts) and a couple of bins that are just solid colours. I have a separate cart for all of my scraps and all are colour coded. But there is much room for improvement!



Do you have any funny or interesting (or embarrassing) quilting related stories to share with our members?

The first quilting retreat that I went on, I was working on a quilt top, finished it, sewed on the last border, stood up, and did a "Ta-Da!!!" Then one of the other ladies pointed out that the top row was on upside down! Whoops! I said "the heck with it" and left it as it was, calling it a design feature. The quilt is that way to this day. I'm sure the person I gifted it to doesn't even realize.

What quilter do you admire most or follow on social media?

Lots and lots! I can't pinpoint one specific quilter as I follow a lot of

them. I spend time looking through Instagram and Pinterest for inspiration, and often go down the rabbit hole. Sometimes the hashtags helps me when I have an idea and want to see if anyone else has done something similar. I also participate in a lot of quilt-alongs, so there are lots of progress posts that I'm looking at. And then again, sometimes just to see what everyone else is up to.

Have you ever worked on group quilts?

Yes. I belong to a couple of different quilting bees. One is an improv group. There are 10 of us in this group. Each person comes up with a theme each month. Using only solids, we have to come up with an improvised block. We can't use a pattern of any sort, but we make two blocks for them based on the theme and the colours they specify. At least one of the quilts has gone to Quilt Canada. It does challenge you and part of the reason I'm doing it is to think outside the box.

And then I belong to another bee, which is more of a simpler block swap. In this case, we actually do pick a free block pattern and make two blocks for the 'queen' each month in the colours and parameters they specify. They put it all together and make their own quilt to do with as they please.

Do you take quilting-related classes?

Zoom has been great for that. I have been able to take classes from someone anywhere in the world. I've taken classes from as far away as Australia and the US, as

well as local classes. It has opened up a lot of opportunities to take additional classes and learn new techniques.

What's in your UFO box?

Lol. Which one? All sorts of things. I have quite a number of different UFOs. I recently finished up several that were from 2013, but there's a little bit of everything and anything.




Can you help with create a Remembrance Quilt?

Join us this summer for the YHQG Mini Mod Swap! Sign up deadline is May 15, 2022.

Sign up online for this fun challenge.

When you register for the mini mod block swap, you'll choose to use either white, grey or black as a background colour, and warm, cool, or neutral colours as the highlight of the block. See the palette choices. This block swap uses solid colours only—no prints or batiks. Groups of five will be formed based on palette choices after the May 15 registration deadline.

Fabric requirements to make the 30 mini mod blocks:

- 1/3 of a yard or about .4 metres of your background fabric: white, grey or black
- Scraps of solids in the colourway you have chosen: warm, cool or neutrals

After groups are formed, you will receive an email with information about the colour preferences of people in your group of five, as well as their names and addresses so you know where to send your blocks. You'll also receive the foundation paper-piecing patterns and links to videos showing other ways to make the blocks with strip piecing.



Each participant will make 30 mini blocks, either foundation paper-pieced or using strip piecing techniques. Have fun and put your blocks together any way you wish!

Each person in the group will keep six blocks and send six blocks to each other person in their group. In other words,

you'll send 24 blocks and receive 24 blocks. Tuck your blocks into a happy card and add a friendly note. What fun to receive mail from other members of the guild!


Please mail your blocks to your group members no later than July 30, 2022.

The designer of this block swap, Berene Campbell, has given this program to guilds for free, but asks that each participant make a small donation (\$3 - \$5) to a bursary she has set up at Ryerson for black, indigenous, and LGBTQ students. 
